



## materials:

- Cardstock in any colour you like
- White cardstock for the message and address
- Double sided tape or glue of your choice
- Brochures, maps and business cards of the places you visit
- Scissors or paper trimmer
- Pen(s)
- Washi tape (optional)
- Postage stamps

Most of us collect all kinds of paper “stuff” when we go on holiday. From till slips to maps to business cards of quaint gift shops in the Karoo. My excuse is that I will use it as decorations when I get round to making an album. In reality it just gathers dust and gets added to the overflowing boxes of “stuff” from previous trips. I moved house twice during the last three years and stumbled upon at least four boxes filled with ephemera dating back to the early 1990’s.

When we went to the Kruger Park in January this year, I decided to put my collection of Kruger Park ephemera to use. Instead of buying postcards from the curio shops, I made my own. I sent them from the Kruger to myself (for my travel journal) and the rest to family and friends.

There are not many restrictions on the size of postcards and the Post Office will assist with the postage required. These postcards needed one standard stamp each. As luck would have it, there was a set of postage stamps of the Big 5 which perfectly complemented my postcards.



USE THE POSTCARDS AS YOUR DAILY TRAVELOGUE TO RECORD THE NAMES OF PLACES YOU’VE VISITED OR TO LIST THE THINGS YOU DID. GET THE REST OF THE FAMILY INVOLVED AND ASK THEM TO DO THE WRITING. DISCARD ALL UNUSED “STUFF” WHILST ON THE TRIP.

## instructions:

- 1 Cut the coloured and white cardstock to measure about 15cm x 10cm each.
- 2 Glue the white and coloured cardstock together.
- 3 Cut bits from your collection of “stuff” and decorate the front of the postcard.
- 4 Add washi tape, stickers, titles or whatever you have at your disposal.
- 5 Write your message and the address on the back and remember to add a postage stamp.
- 6 If you’re lucky your creations will be waiting for you when you get home.
